College Essay

This college application essay was written by a 17 year-old Gaston County student who has given us permission to share. The author is one of only 43 Gaston County high school students to receive academic honors from the College Board National Recognition Program.

6:35 am used to be the moment I dreaded the most – it was the start of a relentless cycle that often stretched to 6:45, the 6:55 and finally 7:05 as I repeatedly struggled to style my hair. May natural hair seemed to defy all the beauty standards around me. Each strand felt like a symbol of my insecurities, and each attempt to fix it chipped away at my confidence as a biracial teen. I constantly felt defeated. It was impossible to embrace the characteristics that made me who I am.

Everything changed on May 2, 2021, at 4:15 pm, during my first hair appointment for braids, a style I had not considered before. That day marked a pivotal turning point, igniting a newfound reverence for the aspects of myself that make me unique. My hair, once a source of frustration, transformed into my proudest form of self-expression. What had once filled me with dread became a source of empowerment, reshaping my perception of challenges in to opportunities to celebrate my identity, and fueling my journey of self-discovery and resilience.

After that day, I set out to learn how to style my hair on my own, experimenting with techniques and products until I found what worked for me. Through this process, I discovered beauty in uniqueness and the essence of my natural hair. I learned to embrace challenges and find strength in my difference. I also notice positive changes in various aspects of my life, particularly in my interactions with others. One example of this was during my time volunteering at the local library. A little girl approached me, here eyes lighting up as she admired my braids. In that moment, I realized I wanted to be a role model not just for how I present my hair, but also for my confidence, drive and character.

Now, when I look in the mirror, I see not just my reflection but growth, acceptance, and perseverance. I face obstacles head-on with a confidence that extends beyond my hair and into every aspect of my life. I aspire to show others, especially young girls, that embracing our uniqueness can lead to true strength. Currently, I'm focused on my goal of growing out my natural hair by gradually trimming off the damaged ends. This process has been challenging, but it serves as a reminder to keep pushing forward. Each trim symbolizes by commitment to personal growth and resilience, teaching me to navigate obstacles with determination and learn from every experience.

I take pride in who I've become and the determination I've developed along the way. That pivotal hair appointment on May 21, 2021 ignited my journey of self-discovery. I've learned patience, resourcefulness, and a quite strength that empowers me. My hair no longer defines me; instead, it represents the progress I've made and the resilience that shapes my identity today.
